POTTING BULBS IN CONTAINERS

Materials Needed:

- 1. Clean pots with good drainage; 6" deep for small bulbs, taller pots for larger bulbs or layering
- 2. Good soil mix
- 3. Healthy bulbs
- 4. Fertilizer, such as Bulb Tone

Directions for planting bulbs in pots:

- 1. Lay a coffee filter or paper towel in the bottom of the pot. Add 1-2" of soil. Sprinkle with fertilizer. Add more soil so that bulbs will not touch the fertilizer.
- 2. Place bulbs, pointed ends up, at least 1" from the edge of the pot. Bulbs maybe close, but should not touch one another.
- 3. If layering, place the largest bulbs first and cover with soil. Then add the next size bulb and cover. A third layer of smaller bulbs may be added, if you can cover them with 2" of soil.
- 4. Water the soil thoroughly. Pots may stay outside until the first frost.
- 5. Bulbs don't get enough protection in containers and can freeze. Pots should be stored in an unheated garage or cold frame. Pots can also be buried in a pile of mulch.
- 6. If stored in the garage, pots will need to be lightly watered every 2 or 3 weeks. Do not overwater.
- 7. When you see growth and the temperature is above 30 degrees, the pots can be taken out to get some sun. Bring them back inside when the temperature drops.
- 8. Enjoy. Be sure to deadhead the blooms after flowering. Fertilize again after flowering. Allow the foliage to die back naturally. You can pop in some annuals to camouflage the dying foliage.
